**February 24 Noon 280 Park** Jang Wook Huh, UB Department of English  
Title: Friendship in the Barracks: Black and Korean Soldiers in U.S. Army Bases

Abstract: This talk examines the interactions between Black and Korean soldiers in the 1940s that critiqued the imperialistic presence of the U.S. army in Korea.

Bio: Jang Wook Huh teaches in the department of English at the University at Buffalo. He is working on a book that traces a literary history of political and cultural connections between African Americans and Koreans from the late nineteenth to mid-twentieth centuries.

**March 3 12:30\* 509 O'Brian** Mitra Sharafi, University of Wisconsin School of Law  
Title: "Corruption and Forensic Experts in British India"

Bio: Mitra Sharafi is a legal historian of South Asia. She holds law degrees from Cambridge and Oxford and a doctorate in history from Princeton. Sharafi's book, *Law and Identity in Colonial South Asia: Parsi Legal Culture, 1772-1947* (Cambridge University Press, 2014) won the Law and Society Association's J. Willard Hurst Prize for socio-legal history in 2015. Her research interests include South Asian legal history; the history of the legal profession; the history of colonialism; the history of contract law; law and society; law and religion; law and minorities; legal consciousness; legal pluralism; and the history of science and medicine. **March 10 Noon 280 Park** Daniel Majchrowicz, Northwestern University  
Title: The Case of the Vanishing Maharaja: Urdu Travel Literature and Princely Politics in South Asia

Abstract: In 1851, the young Tukoji Holkar, Maharaja of Indore, went missing under suspicious circumstances. He'd skipped town to make a clandestine tour of North India. After his return, Holkar did something that was doubly unprecedented for a Persian-speaking court of his time: he wrote a travelogue, and he wrote it in Urdu. By the end of the 19th century, writing about travel have become a well established expression of princely praxis, reflecting Holkar's and the princely states' desire to use travel literature to stabilize their legitimacy at a time when colonial predations had rendered it increasingly precarious.

Bio: Daniel Majchrowicz is an Assistant Professor of South Asian Literature and Culture at Northwestern University. He received his PhD from Harvard University in 2015. He is currently working on two manuscripts. The first is a study of Urdu travel writing from 1830-1950, tentatively titled "Travel and the Means to Victory: Travel and Travel Writing in Modern South Asia." The second is a collaborative project aimed at producing a scholarly anthology of Muslim women's travel writing from across the world, entitled "Veiled Voyagers."

Title: Singapore's Baghdadi Community from 1795 to 2017: Setting a Standard for Jewish Identity in East and Southeast Asia.

Bio: Jonathan Goldstein has been a Professor of East Asian History at the University of West Georgia since 1981. His Ph.D. in Chinese history is from the University of Pennsylvania. His fields of research include the Jewish communities of China, the Holocaust and its impact on East Asia, and Sino-Israeli relations. \*Talk on MONDAY.





AMERICAN INSTITUTE OF INDIAN STUDIES FELLOWSHIP COMPETITION

The American Institute of Indian Studies (AIIS) invites applications from scholars from all disciplines who wish to conduct their research in India. Junior fellowships are given to doctoral candidates at universities in the U.S. to conduct research for their dissertations in India for up to eleven months. Senior long-term (six to nine months) and short-term (four months or less) fellowships are available for scholars who hold the Ph.D. degree. Scholarly/Professional development fellowships are available to scholars and professionals who have not previously worked in India. Creative and Performing Arts fellowships are available to practitioners of the arts of India. Eligible applicants include 1) U.S. citizens; and 2) citizens of other countries who are students or faculty members at U.S. colleges and universities (this rule does not apply to U.S. citizens).
