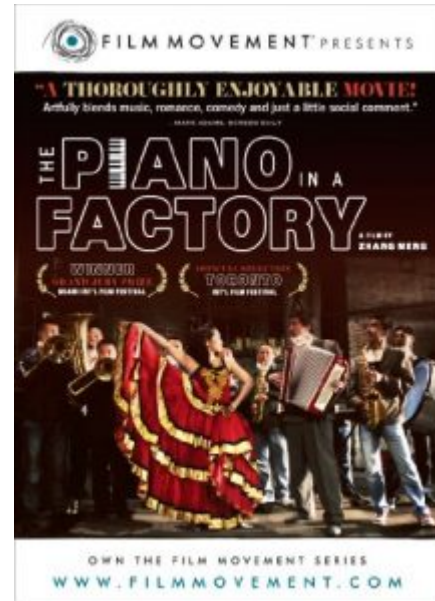

- **UB IMPACT Funding.** IMPACT awards build on Realizing UB 2020, bringing together researchers in theme areas: Humanity; Justice; Innovation; Environment and/or Health. They reward new areas of creative activities and projects that foster unique collaborations. Our goal is to develop preliminary data that can support external grant

applications and directly demonstrate outcomes in these themes. Awards up to \$35,000. **Deadline Oct. 16, 5p.** [Learn more.](#)

- **Nila T. Gnamn Junior Faculty Research Fund.** The Asia Pacific Economic Cooperation (APEC) Study Center at UB, in conjunction with the Department of Geography and Asian Studies Program at the College of Arts & Sciences, invites proposals for funding from scholars affiliated with any department or academic program at UB to support research related to the Southeast Asia region. Small grants between \$500 and \$2,000 will be awarded for expenses related to travel, per diem, conference fees, library research, data collection, and other research costs.
